

## C1 W 9, 10, 21, 22 Latin Noun Endings–Singular 4th Declension

### Nominative

Pronounced /oōs/ as in  
“puss in boots”

**-us**



### Genitive

Pronounced /oos/ as in  
“moose”

**-ūs**



### Dative

Most often pronounced  
/oo/-/ē/ as in “gooey”  
said very quickly

**-ūī**



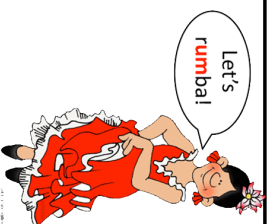
Some sources pronounce this as  
/oō/-/ē/ as in “cookie”



### Accusative

Pronounced /oōm/ as in  
“rumba”

**-um**



Tip: The u is pronounced  
/oo/ as in rook or book.

### Ablative

Pronounced /oo/ as in  
“shoe”

**-ū**

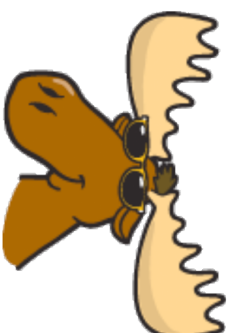


## C1 W 9, 10, 21, 22 Latin Noun Endings–Plural 4th Declension

### Nominative

Pronounced /oos/ as in  
“moose”

**-ūs**



### Genitive

Pronounced /oō/-/oōm/ as  
in “rumba”

**-uum**

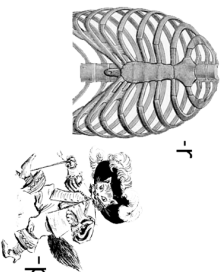

**-ibus**

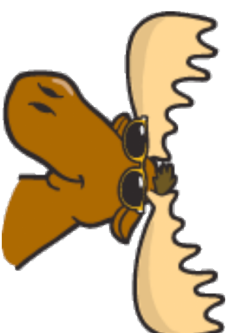

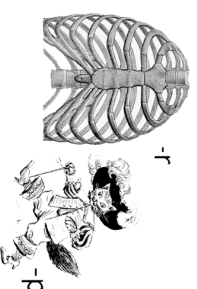
